
KIRKCALDY AREA LOCAL COMMUNITY **PLAN** 2015 - 2016



Introduction

The Kirkcaldy Area Local Community Plan sets out how public, private and voluntary organisations will work together with our communities to make Kirkcaldy Area a better, cleaner, safer, stronger, and more vibrant place to live and visit. It is built around four themes:

- Improving Economy, Employment and Learning Opportunities;
- Promoting Neighbourhood Development and increasing Neighbourhood Pride;
- Improving Outcomes for Families, Early Years and Young People;
- Improving Health and Well-Being.

We are contributing to two high level outcomes of the Fife Community Plan: Tackling Inequalities and Increasing Employment. Therefore we have a particular focus on anti-poverty strategies and have identified four Neighbourhood Development Areas where inequalities are greatest and employment lowest:

- Gallatown area;
- Linktown and Invertiel;
- Templehall; and
- Burntisland Castle area.

Foreword

Our commitment is to help make Kirkcaldy Area a place where partnerships flourish for the benefit of all of its citizens. We will help create opportunities for community empowerment and for groups and individuals to influence decisions in their neighbourhoods. That way we promote personal self-worth and self-belief and increase participation in civic life.

We will concentrate on specific neighbourhood planning for our four geographical areas of greatest need namely Gallatown, Linktown, Templehall and the Castle area of Burntisland. We must achieve improvements in all four zones which have for too many years been consistently high in the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation.

Strategic Context

The Fife Partnership is responsible for leading the community planning process in Fife. It is made up of elected representatives, board members and senior managers from across Fife's public and voluntary organisations - Fife Council, NHS Fife, Police Scotland, Fife Voluntary Action, Scottish Enterprise, Skills Development Scotland, SEStrans (South East Scotland Transport Partnership), Fife College and St Andrews University.

<u>Fife's Community Plan</u> is the over-arching strategic plan for Fife. It provides a framework and reference point for other strategies and plans we put in place. The current community plan identifies a number of challenges and opportunities that need to be addressed over the next ten years. *Reducing Inequalities* is one of three high level outcomes identified in the community plan, along with *increasing employment* and *tackling climate change*.

"Reducing inequalities to tackle multiple deprivation will require broad based action from economic development; health; education; housing; community safety; sport, leisure and culture and environmental improvement. It requires a long term commitment to break cycles of deprivation." Many communities in Fife and across Scotland have longstanding problems that reflect persistent inequalities in society. The Christie Commission endorsed a shift away from crisis intervention towards more preventative approaches. This should improve outcomes for individuals and communities, reduce inequalities and reduce problems in the future.

Prevention should be evidence based, building on proven approaches whilst also supporting innovation. It needs a planned approach, incorporating a robust assessment process that can demonstrate reduced or deferred demand on services - delivering both value for money and better outcomes.

However, it can also be opportunistic, with staff in a local area working together and sharing resources to support activity that reduces demand on services.

Prevention also involves shifting power from those who provide services to those who use services - promoting greater co-ownership of our actions and their impacts. When individual service users and communities are at the centre of service design, and when services draw on the assets that are already available - the strengths, knowledge and experiences of communities, families and individuals – then the opportunities to build effective prevention will be greatest.

Wherever possible, Fife will adopt an assets-based approach to improving local areas. We will encourage the use of local capacity, skills, connections and knowledge, whether these assets sit within organisations, associations or communities.

Community Plan Evidence Base

The <u>Fife Partnership Strategic Assessment 2014</u> is designed to provide the evidence base for identifying priorities for the Fife Community Planning Partnership – down to 7 area level – for the next three years (2014-2017). These priorities will help to inform future work plans and area priorities, and will provide a solid foundation for any future refresh of the Fife Community Plan and associated documents, including the Single Outcome Agreement.

The defined aim of the Strategic Assessment is to identify, assess and assist in the prioritisation of issues across Fife and those facing the seven committee areas within Fife, providing a robust, wide-ranging evidence base that will allow local areas to make informed decisions in setting priorities that require medium to long-term action.

The strategic assessment will be reviewed on an annual basis and any changes will be reflected in future versions of the Local Community Plan.

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Kirkcaldy Area Priorities for 2015/2016

Through consideration of the Kirkcaldy Area information that has emerged from the data collection process, the following issues are high level priorities:

Early Years, Young People and Families

- Promoting and developing early year's activities informed by the community.
- Supporting the potential of children and young people in achieving individual goals.
- Developing partnerships to address external factors impacting on children, young people and families.
- Linking post-school opportunities for local young people to local businesses, colleges and employers.
- Developing an aspirational culture in families and communities living in poverty in the Kirkcaldy area which allow children and young people to flourish in an equal manner to their peers.

Welfare Reform

There is a need to ensure that we respond effectively to the expected impacts of the Welfare Reform agenda around the areas of supporting unemployed people, increasing skill levels, knowledge and opportunities. Young people need to be particularly supported in this endeavour, ensuring a secure future in education and work. The plight of young people in welfare reform should continue to be a particular focus for the Kirkcaldy area as a result of the scale of claimants in this category which is above the Fife and Scottish averages.

Economy, Employment and Learning

- Maximising the potential for tourism in the area by:
 - The formation of a dedicated partnership to promote the Kirkcaldy area as a tourist destination:
 - Exploring how targeting training and skills promotion can promote tourism business opportunities.
- Consider how location and incentives can be developed to attract businesses which can provide local employment.
- Promotion and implementation of the Kirkcaldy Town Centre *Time for Action* regeneration plan.
- Enhancing greenspace and the public realm to be through community participation and partnership working.
- Developing community based learning opportunities to increase people's skills and employability prospects in line with employment trends.



Social Enterprise

Kirkcaldy has experienced some difficulties in setting up social enterprises and more action is required to increase the confidence and capacity in potential organisations and individuals. It may be possible to consider whether existing Council services may be run by social enterprises in light of emerging budget constraints. This will help close the inequalities gap and potentially create jobs, employment and opportunities in areas of greatest need.

Housing

- Explore community engagement processes around affordable housing options.
- With housing partners, examine the feasibility and impact of providing more one bedroom properties locally.
- Promote a multiagency approach to supporting Kirkcaldy tenants with poverty issues.
- Tacking household antisocial behaviour and its impact on communities.
