Call for Engagement

1. Scotland's Domestic Abusive Taskforce: Domestic Homicide Review

Scotland's Domestic Abuse Taskforce is currently undertaking scoping to inform the development of a Domestic Homicide Review (DHR) model. They are seeking the views of those with lived experience and professionals working with victims and families of domestic homicide. The responses received will be collated and published as part of a report that the Taskforce will use to inform the model development.

Organisations wishing to participate should complete the <u>DHR Model – Engagement Preferences Form</u> before 30th October 2023.

2. Research into the experience of Black missing children

ListenUp and Missing People are carrying out research to explore the experiences of Black missing children, including any unique drivers for them going missing, any risks that the Black community specifically might be facing, and their experience of the response from the police and other professionals. They will be carrying out interviews with previously missing children, as well as collecting evidence through surveys for young people, their parents, and for the professionals that work with them.

3. Scottish Recommended Allowance for Foster and Kinship Carers

The Scottish Government has announced the new Scottish Recommended Allowance, the first standard national allowance to help foster and kinship carers support children and young people – the weekly allowances will be backdated to 1 April 2023.

9. Inform Young People Training – Technology Assisted Harmful Sexual Behaviour

Inform Young People is a short psycho-educational programme developed by the Lucy Faithfull Foundation / Stop It Now. It is designed to help young people and young adults (13- 21) who have displayed harmful sexual or illegal behaviour online. It also aims to support their family members, to help them understand what has happened and assist them in supporting the young person.

An upcoming 2-day training course on 6th and 7th November will equip staff to deliver the programme with young people in a 1-1 setting. Participants should work in a setting where they will be able to deliver this programme directly to young people.

12. Children's Services Reform Research

CELCIS has published the third output of the Children's Services Reform Research (CSRR) study, a statistical analysis which explores whether there has been an association between the type of structural integration of health and social care services in Scotland and the outcomes for children, young people, and families in need of support.

14. Research on teacher-perpetrated misconduct

The University of Greenwich and other institutions have published a report on the sexual misconduct and harassment of students by teachers in secondary schools in Ireland and the UK. A survey was conducted with 593 adults in the UK and Ireland who had experienced some form of sexual harassment or misconduct during their time in secondary school.
