

Scottish Community Orientated Medicine Programme (ScotCOM) - Doctors in your Community

Participation and Engagement Summary Feedback Report

In March 2024 NHS Fife and the University of St Andrews announced the development of a new medical degree programme and they wanted to give the people and communities of Fife the opportunity to be involved and to use their input to help to shape the knowledge, skills and training of the medical workforce of the future.

The consultation received 187 responses from across Fife with responses from diverse groups including minority ethnic communities and people who described themselves as having a disability.

We asked you to share your thoughts and experiences on seeing a doctor in relation to the 12 separate attributes below.



The top 2 attributes that people chose to respond to and share their experiences were **Compassion and Empathy** and **Listening and Understanding** with 82% and 75% respectively.

You said that the key behaviours or actions that demonstrate the above attributes in a doctor include:

Explaining treatment options

Allowing time

Providing reassurance

Making eye contact

Giving information in an accessible format

Asking and answering questions

We asked if there were any other attributes you considered important in a doctor and you said that the following were important to you:

Patience Multi-disciplinary teamwork Holistic approach

Understanding the community they work in Professionalism

Non-verbal communication skills Equality and diversity

We asked how current experiences matched with the attributes you identified as valuable and why you answered that way:
